After the third quarter remittance was sent to Conference, we have sent 63.6% of our Pledge to Mission for 2017. We have one quarter to make up the deficit and meet our Pledge of \$40,000 for the calendar year.

Now the good news from our District Annual Meeting. Congratulations to the 31 units who achieved 5 and 6 star Mission Giving status! Certificates were presented at our District Annual Meeting. At 60 cents per second, the candle burned at our Annual Meeting for 8957.533 seconds or 2 hours, 29 minutes and 17.533 The time our candle was lit seconds. represents the length of time United Methodist Women mission work supported through our Candleburning Offering.

Another opportunity for giving this year was the Legacy Fund. On March 23, 2019, UMW will celebrate 150 years of serving women, children and youth worldwide. The Legacy Fund is an endowment to pass on the legacy of the 150 years we have inherited to future UMW members and ministries for the next 150 years. We had 11 individuals and 7 units contribute to the Legacy Fund through the district. speaker at Advent Breakfast asked that her honorarium be contributed to the Legacy Our mission doll, Lydia, began collecting contributions for the Legacy Fund. During third quarter, units sent donations directly to local mission, The Haven Shelter,

Local units are encouraged to contribute to the 5 channels of Mission Giving - the Pledge to Mission, Gift to Mission, Gift in Memory, Special Mission Recognition and World Thank Offering. If your unit has \$60 for Mission Giving, you can be a 5 Star unit by giving \$5 to Pledge to Mission, \$5 to Gift to Mission, \$5 to Gift in Memory, \$40 to Special Mission Recognition and \$5 to World Thank Offering. If you find you have \$.60 more to give, you can give to the Virginia Conference 6th channel. Candleburning, and be a 6 Star unit.

Individuals may contribute to the 5 channels of Mission Giving by becoming a Rainbow Giver. A one-time contribution of \$60 will be divided as above and the individual will be recognized at the District Annual Meeting and presented with a Rainbow Giver pin. In addition, the Rainbow Giver's unit will be a 5 star unit. The form for Rainbow Givers is attached.

In preparation for Harvest Prayer Breakfast and Advent Breakfast, please bring or send your local unit Pledge to Mission for 2018 to the meeting. We will have a Pledge moment at the Advent Breakfast.

As we are significantly behind in our district pledge to mission for 2017, a good practice is to keep enough money in your local unit treasury to sustain you through the first quarter, and give the rest to mission giving. Please consider this as you prepare your fourth quarter remittance.

SOCIAL ACTION

This season change has also brought an overwhelming sadness to our nation, in the face of the violent mass shooting that occurred in Las Vegas on October 1, 2017. We pray for the victims and the families who

We need to begin exercising our power of advocacy by contacting our state legislators and assure that we get out to vote so that we are electing officials who have our women and children's health as a priority. According to statistics compiled by Empowerhouse and found on their webpage, the following statistics regarding domestic violence are as follows:

- ☐ The average length of stay in shelter is one month.
- One in every four women in the United States will experience severe physical violence at the hands of an intimate partner in her lifetime.
- □ Every five days, a Virginian is killed because of domestic violence. (Family and Intimate Partner Homicide Virginia: 1999-2007, Office of the Chief Medical Examiner, October, 2009, page 50: "Between the years 1999 and 2007 there were 575 intimate partner homicides.")
- □ Domestic violence is a major cause of homelessness for women in the United States.
- Empowerhouse serves over 2,400 people, on average, each year.
- Area law enforcement agencies serving the Fredericksburg region including Stafford, King George, Caroline, and Spotsylvania, respond to over 6,400 domestic related calls on average, per year.

Our goal for 2017 is to have 100 percent district reporting and all of our 27,000 local units represented in the census. We are asking for your commitment to make this happen. This will be a joint effort as the Office of Membership will be reaching out to all 27,000 local units by email and mailings to inform unit leaders about the importance of filling out the census and how it relates directly to United Methodist Women's efforts in fulfilling our core commitments: spiritual growth, leadership development, transformative education, service advocacy and organizing for membership growth.

You will recognize some changes on the form. There are several new questions that are focused on strategies around increasing membership, our social justice priorities, and training needs. Our goal is to increase membership by 2 percent at the district level by 2020, so the feedback received through the census is critical in how we plan strategically to meet this goal.

We are determined to reach this goal. Let's be inspired to share our rich legacy of mission and all that United Methodist Women has to offer, so that we can celebrate another 150 years of turning faith, hope and love into action on behalf of women, children and youth around the world!

Kyle Lorenzino explained the very complicated maneuvering that is part of elder care needs in United States today. Visiting Angels is a service that supplements home care, Hospice care, nursing care...just about any type of care that is needed for the elderly. It often is exactly what you need in the home but it's all based on experienced professional assessment of the situation.

It was very helpful for Kyle to explain the differences in the various services that is needed and how Visiting Angels can step in to assess and help. Kyle stated, "Often families are in crises and it's our job to evaluate the home situation and health of the client and be able to give our best


advice on moving forward...often it's not to hire Visiting Angels immediately."
